This year's Annual Dymond Lecture will take place on Thursday 5 December 2024 at 7.00 p.m. The speaker will be Craig Lambert and John McAleer of the University of Southampton, who will be presenting a talk entitled 'English merchant shipping and early modern maritime communities, c.1588-c.1765'.

The talk will examine how England's merchant fleet developed over these two centuries, who sailed in the ships and what roles the sailors played in their local communities; and how war, politics and regional differences affected English seaborne trade.

Call for 'Zooniverse' participants The Material Culture of Wills: England 1540-1790

We are looking for participants to help us transcribe a sample of 25,000 English wills that were made between 1540 and 1790. Using the online 'Zooniverse' platform, you'll be joining a research project which aims to reveal how ownership of, and attitudes towards, objects changed in a period of profound economic transformation. By helping us transcribe these wills, you will make a vital archive of English history more accessible, and lay foundations for future initiatives to widen access to the manuscripts held in <u>The National Archives</u>.

We have automatically transcribed the contents of wills from five periods across the sixteenth, seventeenth and eighteenth centuries 1538-1552, 1604-1608, 1664-1666, 1725-1726 and 1785-1786, totalling 25,000 wills in total. You will be contributing by checking these transcriptions and suggesting corrections where needed. You will have the opportunity to improve your reading of early modern handwriting—training is provided on our 'Zooniverse' site. You are welcome to contribute as much or as little as you would like as the 'bite-size' transcription checking tasks are designed to fit around other commitments.
